

## CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT TO ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING 2024 FOR CALENDAR YEAR 1 JANUARY TO 31 DECEMBER 2023

# Introduction

UBC is the Peak Body for bushland conservation groups: We are a community association of 90 member groups and 100+ individual members – all of whom have a common interest in the conservation of our natural biodiversity, with a particular focus on urban bushlands and wetlands. UBC is wholly volunteer led and relies on membership fees, donations, grants, and volunteer hours to deliver on our advocacy role of being a public voice for what remains of our urban bushland and wetlands, especially on the Swan Coastal Plain and surrounding areas.

2023 was a busy year. We celebrated 30 years of advocacy; we finalised our State NRM grant and presented our volunteer guide to our members; we ran information sessions for environmental assessment processes; workshops for members; made a record number of submissions into environmental processes and finished the year mobilising against threats to the independence of the EPA and loss of appeal rights for citizens.

As we enter 2024 and recognising that both Federal and WA Governments go to the polls in 2025, it is clear we need to raise our voices louder and further to protect our precious biodiversity. We need to mobilise our local communities and let our elected officials know how important our biodiversity and ecosystem services it provides is, and how at risk it is from the actions of this government.

# 2023 Highlights

## Celebrating 30 Years of UBC

We returned once again to the beautiful Bush Forever setting at the Herdsman Lake Discovery Centre where 80 people gathered at sunset on 21 May 2023 to celebrate 30 years of UBC advocacy. Iva Hayward Jackson gave an informative acknowledgement of country, followed by speeches from the Minister for the Environment, Reece Whitby, and the facilitator of the 'City Bush Guides', Lesley Shaw. We used the occasion as an opportunity to recognise and thank:

- All who have served on the 31 committees of the UBC.
- the leaders of the bushcare groups and the complexity of the roles they undertake.
- All the bushcare group volunteers who do many hours of on ground work, as well as those who just as importantly advocate for local bushland to be understood, protected, well managed for conservation and linked to nearby patches.

## Key Submissions & Campaigns

During 2023 the UBC Submissions Working Group ably led by Colma Keating made 44 submissions. Many of these involved working with other environmental organisations, some were associated with information sharing workshops and a few transitioned to campaigning aimed at mobilising the community. Read more on our "Your Voice Needed Now' page. Picking out just a few....

*Greater Brixton Street Wetlands*: This is one of the most important wetlands on the Swan Coastal Plain and the conservation community are very concerned about the negative and far reaching impacts of the proposed expansion of the Maddington Kenwick Strategic Employment Area. UBC hosted an information session on 24 July and followed up with a guide to encourage submissions. Submissions are under review.

*Forest Management Plan 2024 – 2033 (FMP*): Note that this is the first FMP post the decision to halt old growth logging. Throughout 2023 UBC joined with many other environmental groups and made submissions and appeals to strengthen the FMP through raising concern about proposals for ecological thinning and prescribed burning. It gained Ministerial Approval 30 November.

*Roe 8/9 Corridor*: UBC joined others and called on the WA government to adopt a visionary approach to the Cockburn Green Corridor that will conserve and protect all existing native vegetation along the corridor, including the areas currently reserved for intersections and restore ecosystems along the corridor to create viable ecological connectivity. The Department of Planning, Lands and Heritage (DPLH) indicate that responses have informed the preparation of a proposed amendment to the MRS to remove the road reservation. <u>More here</u>.

Lot 123 Mortimer Road, Casuarina (Lot 123): This is 45 hectares (ha) in size and is proposed to be subdivided into two lots; one conservation lot of 7.9 hectares (ha) and a balance lot for residential development. Lot 123 contains excellent quality Banksia woodland vegetation, threatened fauna habitat, and a conservation category wetland. UBC strongly recommended that all of Lot 123 be acquired by the State Government, then transferred to the Crown and added to the conservation estate as an 'A' class reserve for the purpose of conservation of nature. Public submissions closed 4 December and are still under review.

*Perth Surf Park, Jandakot*. UBC campaigned with The Beeliar Group for a halt to the planned destruction of a site that includes banksia woodlands, Carnaby's Black Cockatoo foraging habitat and a Conservation Category Wetland to build the Perth Surf Park. We engaged fully in the consultation processes including through to lodging appeals. Concurrently UBC has mounted a public awareness campaign led by Heidi Hardisty through the Action Network platform to bring issues to the attention of local State politicians. Appeal still under review.

*Protect WA Nature – Save the EPA*: We went into the Christmas break with great concerns about the Cook Government's commitment to the environment given their release of the recommendations of the Vogel -McFerran 'Independent Review of WA Environmental Approvals Processes and Procedures'. This review included no public or community consultation and some of its recommendations have worrying consequences for the independence of the EPA and its capacity to protect our biodiversity. As we enter 2024 it is clear we need to raise our voices louder and further to protect our precious biodiversity. We need to mobilise our local communities and let our elected officials know how important our biodiversity is and how at risk it is from the actions of this government. To this end the Conservation Council of WA is leading an across NGO campaign. This will be a key UBC campaign in 2024. Keep up to date here.

We rely on your local knowledge to help make it as simple as possible for all our members and friends to make submissions.

## Memberships

At 31 December 2023, *UBC Membership* was 90 Member Groups and 108 supporters. Thank you to everyone who supports UBC, your presence makes our organisation stronger.

#### Grants

In 2023, UBC held 8 grants including acting as sponsor on 4 grants for unincorporated Member Groups, with grant income of \$44,418. 5 grants were finalised during the year.

We completed our State NRM funded project "Building community capacity to care for urban bushland" with the production of a written report plus volunteer recruitment guide, all launched at previously mentioned workshop.

New grants received included from Murdoch University via Lotterywest for the Keep Carnaby's Flying project, the Wettenhall Environment Trust to fund workshops for members and from Volunteering WA to fund UBC's 30<sup>th</sup> celebration.

## Committee operations

We continued with our Committee (or Board) / Subcommittee **operating structure** so that committee meetings don't get bogged down in detail and subcommittees can just get on with their work. We welcomed new members to our subcommittees during the year. They are an excellent way to learn and contribute. The following **subcommittees** operated during 2023 (i) Submissions, (ii) Advocacy; (iii) Communications and (iv) Events & Member Engagement. Thank you to all involved.

We were not able to fill the position of **Treasurer** during the year. The 2023 Audit has made explicit comment about the importance of filling the Treasurer position in 2024.

However, we were able to maintain good **financial management** during the year with our contract bookkeeper and because our former treasurer Chris Allbeury continued to monitor our finances and ensure invoices were paid on time and key governance issues were not forgotten.

We applied for **Deductible Gift Recipiency** in early 2023 and this was granted in late 2023. All future donations to UBC are therefore tax deductible.

**Cyber security** – in late 2023 we agreed to implement changes to our online membership module so that we hold only the information required for a Member Register (Name, email, phone). This means we will no longer hold addresses. In all systems we use, we are implementing two factor authentication.

UBC was supported throughout the year with the continuation of the appointment of Vicki Caulfield as a part-time, short term **Executive Officer**. This support has made us realise just how valuable a paid role is for the organisation.

## Our People

Christine Allbeury OAM: Chris was awarded a Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) in the 2023 Australia Day Honours list for her contribution to conservation and the environment over many years. Chris was UBC Treasurer from 2007 to 2022 – a massive contribution to our organisation. At all times she operated with great diligence and with an eye to ensuring that UBC operated to the highest standards of governance and financial accountability. Nothing ever escaped her gaze. As well as being Treasurer, she was our Membership Officer and website admin. An enormous volunteer load for which we are truly grateful.

## **Bush Forever Update**

**Continuing request for the completion of Bush Forever**: UBC continues to advocate for the completion of Bush Forever and for the purchase of sites still outstanding and for the transfer of Bush Forever areas from the care of the WA Planning Commission (WAPC) to either the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions (DBCA) or the appropriate Local Government Authority (LGA). We do this at meetings with the Minister for the Environment, through Questions on Notice to State parliament and through meetings

with staff from government agencies. This included a briefing on Bush Forever sites in July by DPLH and a meeting with the new Director General of DBCA in October.

# Other conservation issues

### Campaigning for the protection of black cockatoos

- *'Keep Carnaby's Flying Ngoolarks Forever'* project. UBC is a partner organisation in this project being led by Murdoch University (MU). The first year of the project has been highly successful. Read more further down.
- Save the Black Cockatoos: This campaign has involved a number of organisations including UBC and continued throughout 2023 with volunteer support only. The <u>third-party referral</u> made by Dr Hugh Finn to protect the remaining pines in the Gnangara Pine Plantation from removal led to a notice to terminate assessment in December because the proponents advised they would not proceed with the proposal being assessed by the EPA.
- Other local campaigns included <u>Save Erindale Road Bushland</u> and <u>Move the Surf Park</u>.

## Feral Cats

UBC was involved in advocacy around (domestic) cat containment and feral cats during 2023. We reported on the Feral Cat Symposium in the Urban Bush Telegraph (<u>Autumn 2023</u>). We then met with the staff for the Minister for Local Government in October to advocate for changes to the Cat Act to enable cat containment. #### Fire

The Fire and Air Symposium was held in May 2023 and followed on from the highly successful Fire & Biodiversity Forum in June 2021. ## Collaboration with other conservation NGOs

Throughout 2023 UBC engaged with many of the other conservation NGOs to share ideas and draft submissions. We engaged strongly with CCWA, WSWA and others over a range of issues and are a member of the Working Party developing and delivering the campaign to <u>Protect WA Nature – Save the EPA</u>.

## Meetings with Ministers and Senior Government officers

## Minister for Environment

A meeting was held with Minister Whitby on 22 February with a focus primarily on the acquisition and management of Bush Forever sites. Minister Whitby also attended and spoke at UBC's 30<sup>th</sup> celebration in May at the Herdsman Lake Discovery Centre. Many of our member Bushcare groups involve their local and Federal MP's in their bushcare activities and are acknowledged by their MP's for their community advocacy and volunteering.

#### Other meetings

UBC met with staff for the **Minister for Local Government** on 16 October with regards to amendments to the Cat Act. UBC met with Stuart Smith, **Director General, DBCA** to discuss the transfer of Bush Forever sites to DBCA management.

## **Grants and Projects**

## State NRM grant

In 2023 we concluded our State NRM funded project "Building community capacity to care for urban bushland" and Project Officer Johanna Riddell worked with Friends of Star Swamp Bushland, the Friends of Trigg Bushland, the Friends of Wireless Hill, the Friends of Lake Gwelup, the Friends of Erindale Road Bushland and with officers in the City of Stirling to form the Friends of Cottonwood Bushland. A toolkit of resources was compiled that is useful for novice right through to experienced bushcare groups. This Volunteer Recruitment and Retention Guide and launched that at a workshop on 15 June. You can find all the details on the <u>UBC website</u>. Heidi Hardisty, Christine Richardson, Mary Gray and Colma Keating provided valuable input to the project. Thank you.

## Volunteering WA grant

With 4 Member Groups, UBC successfully applied for \$4,000 to celebrate 30 years of UBC and our collective achievements and ongoing relevance as a Voice for the Bush. This was a highlight of our 2023 activities. UBC especially thanks grant partners Friends of Underwood Avenue Bushland, Friends of Jirdarup Bushland, Friends of Mosman Park Bushland and Friends of Hepburn and Pinnaroo Bushland.

## Wettenhall Environment Trust

UBC was awarded \$10,500 to deliver 2 training workshops for Friends groups that will help them recruit and retain volunteers, building their capacity to improve conservation outcomes and growing connection and community. The first workshop on Community Building with Peter Kenyon was held in November. The second one is scheduled for May 2024.

## Executive Officer, UBC

UBC appointed Vicki Caulfield to a part-time, 6-month contract as Executive Officer to assist the Committee to get several projects started. Vicki has been instrumental in lodging our application for DGR status and has worked closely with Colma Keating to develop a great framework to support submission writing and to establish a Submissions Subcommittee. Vicki also drove the delivery of our very successful workshop on "Understanding the *EP Act* to save urban bushland". Now we need funding to keep this role going.

## Sponsor for Friends groups

UBC sponsored the following projects for unincorporated member groups in 2023:

- Friends of Inglewood Triangle State NRM: Consolidating an ecological linkage in inner city Inglewood' \$10,650 (finalised in 2023)
- Friends of Inglewood Triangle- Australian Government Stronger Communities R8 Installation of seating, (ending in 2024)
- Friends of Coolbinia Bushland Australian Government Stronger Communities R7: 'Upgrade pathways, fence installation'. \$10,500 (finalised in 2023)
- Friends of Coolbina Bushland Volunteering WA grant to celebrate volunteers. \$525.

## Keep Carnaby's Flying - Ngoolarks Forever

UBC is a partner organisation in this project being led by Murdoch University (MU). We received funding from the project to support our engagement in the project. We thank Heidi Hardisty for being our project representative and Vicki Caulfield for her support of our communication efforts for the project.

The first year has been highly successful. MU has been working with four local government associations, (City of Cockburn, City of Wanneroo, Shire of Serpentine-Jarrahdale and City of Melville), environmental NGOs and Aboriginal organisations to engage the community and implement various projects that address threats to the birds and provide food sources and water. Each LGA have implemented their own plantings of cockatoo foraging trees and shrubs, including banksias, jarrahs, marris and macadamia. Most trees survived the dry November. LGAs are taking on the cost of watering over the summer. Read more in the <u>Summer 24</u> edition of the Urban Bush Telegraph.

# Strategic and Operational matters

## Strategic and Operational Plan

Succession planning and governance continued to be a focus for 2023, with considerable effort put into implementing **Working Groups** including extending their membership beyond the UBC committee. Thank you to all who joined us in those working groups during 2023.

With regards **Succession**, we remain committed to a continuous process that plans for people to move on from committee roles. This also means close attention to knowledge retention for the organisation and

ensuring there is knowledge transfer from one person to the next. As people leave the committee, we encourage them to keep up roles with a working group or other volunteer support. Never lost!

We have continued our targeted conservation efforts whilst supporting committee, working groups and members as well as we can.

### Application for DGR status (following on from work in 2022)

The UBC Rules update of 2022 were approved by Department of Energy, Mines, Industry Regulation and Safety (DEMIRS) and in early 2023 an application for Deductible Gift Recipiency was lodged with the Register of Environmental Organisations (REO). In late December 2023 UBC was advised that it had been granted DGR status and was now formally 'in transition' to being managed via the ATO rather than the REO. Various implementation steps are in progress in early 2024.

#### Subcommittees

During 2023 the UBC Committee continued to do more of its operational work via working groups.

#### Submissions Working Group (SWG)

Submissions/consultations are a key avenue for UBC to influence proposed developments as well as government policies/plans that will impact on bushland/wetlands.

Under the exceptional leadership of Colma Keating, the SWG had a strong and productive year. They had the benefit of the expertise of Marg Owen and Mary Gray and by year end UBC has submitted into 44 separate consultation processes. The group rely on you to raise the alarm and brief them on the issues. Thank you to all members of the SWG.

### Communications Working Group (Comms)

The Communications Working Group met periodically during 2023 and delivered more comms and engagement than in 2022. Comms successfully led the production of 4 editions of Urban Bush Telegraph under the guidance of new editor Danielle Brady. We thank Alison Abel for becoming our new Facebook Admin - leading to a much greater UBC presence. Newsletters to Members & Supporters and to the longer 'general' list were circulated approximately monthly by Christine Richardson.

#### Advocacy Working Group (AWG)

The Advocacy Working Group continued in 2023 with Christine Richardson as convenor and with Mary Gray and Elizabeth Eaton as members. Its aim is to create momentum for change at a time when urban bushland faces multiple threats, to strengthen the effectiveness of collaborations, and to establish a team approach to mitigate the risk of losing the wisdom and experience of long-term advocates as time passes. The AWG is still 'a work in progress'.

#### Events & Member Engagement (Events WG)

Events & Member Engagement met periodically during 2023 under the leadership of Sue Conlan and Mitch Plain. They developed the schedule of talks and walks; formalised plans for events management and developed a plan for member engagement. Events WG is still 'work in progress'.

## Urban Bush Telegraph

4 editions of the Urban Bush Telegraph were printed during 2023. Thank you to all contributors. Special thanks to our new editor, Danielle Brady who brought a new style and colour palette to our newsletter.
