Adopting the Model Rules

Following the Special Members' Meeting held in June, the group accepted minor changes to the Constitution, and a Notice of Special Resolution was lodged with the Commissioner of Consumer Protection on the 28th June. Under the Act, as a formality, an Information Statement is due to be lodged no later than 6 months after the end of the financial year. Having anticipated the group embarking on a fund raising campaign for the restoration of the cottage, an ABN and TFN have been acquired. We have since established that as the principle object of our association is not for the purpose of restoration of historic buildings, we are unable to establish a gift fund to fundraise for the building. Our principle purpose is to protect the natural areas in Allen Park for conservation, and will remain so. This will not dampen our enthusiasm to raise the funds, but we are dependent on the City of Nedlands' commitment to getting the cottage repaired.

Planting

It's been a busy period too for our volunteers, as half of this year's quota of 2007 seedlings were planted on 3 bushcare days, a number of Tuesday mornings, and the balance planted by the City's

contractors, Ecojobs.

Planting areas included the top of Melon Hill, Boobook Sector, Rugby Club and Sayer Street.

Bushwalkers may have noticed some small wooden stakes in the bushland. These are to indicate the whereabouts of Wembley wax plants. The markers differentiate them from Geraldton wax, an introduced variety. Geraldton wax seedlings proliferate and will be removed over time.
